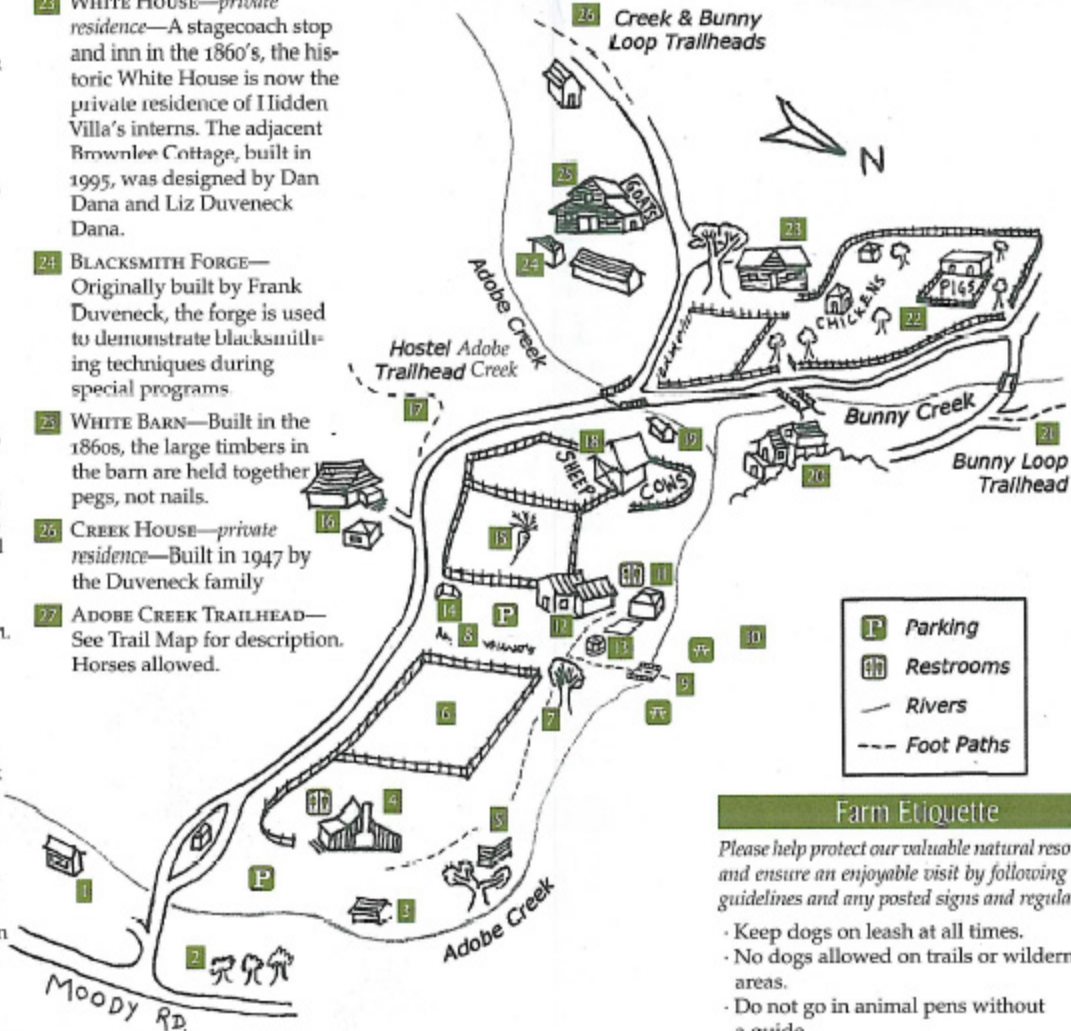


Self-Guided Tour

- 1 **CSA PRODUCE STAND**—Buy seasonal organic produce and seedlings here, when available. The stand was sustainably built using straw bale construction.
- 2 **OLIVE GROVES**—Franciscan monks from Mission Santa Clara planted the grove in the early 1800s. In the 1920s, the Duvenecks planted seedlings along Moody Road.
- 3 **EARTH BERM HOUSE**—*private residence*—This environmentally sustainable building was constructed in 2000.
- 4 **DANA CENTER & LAWN**—Built by Dan Dana in 1990, the Dana Center is available as a facility rental. Lawn area is Hidden Villa's outdoor venue for concerts and other events.
- 5 **NATURE TRAIL & BIRD BLIND**—Learn about native plants and Ohlone Indians. Hide behind the blind and sneak a peek at our resident and visiting birds.
- 6 **STEINMANN'S FIELD**—Pasture for sheep and goats
- 7 **BAY TREE BLUFF**—Meeting place for several Hidden Villa Community Programs
- 8 **WILDLIFE CORRIDOR**—Lined with native plants, the corridor provides a welcoming habitat for local and migrating wildlife.
- 9 **PICNIC AREAS**—Beautifully situated on both sides of Adobe Creek, under the large shade trees, picnic areas are available as facility rentals.
- 10 **THE KNOLL**—Meeting place for several Hidden Villa Community Programs
- 11 **POOL HOUSE**—Restrooms and payphone
- 12 **WOLKEN EDUCATION CENTER (WEC)**—Built in 2001, the WEC houses our Environmental Education, Summer Camp, Community Programs, and Volunteer offices (not open to the public).
- 13 **SITE OF PROPOSED PAVILION**
- 14 **THE KIOSK**—Get maps and information about Hidden Villa and its programs here.
- 15 **EDUCATION GARDEN**—Organic educational teaching garden is open to the public for touring. Please do not pick the produce.
- 16 **THE HOSTEL**—Established in 1937 and rebuilt in 2001, this is the oldest operating hostel in the US.
- 17 **HOSTEL TRAILHEAD**—See Trail Map for description. No horses allowed.
- 18 **TIN BARN**—Houses our Jersey cows, goats, and sheep.
- 19 **MILK HOUSE**—Used for milk storage and butter making.
- 20 **DUVENECK HOUSE**—Built in 1930 as the residence for the Duveneck family, it now houses Hidden Villa's administration offices (not open to the public). Available as a facility rental.
- 21 **BUNNY LOOP TRAIL HEAD**—See Trail Map for description. No horses allowed.
- 22 **ORCHARD, POULTRY PALACE & PIGGERY**—See rare breeds of chickens in the poultry palace and antique heritage apple varieties in the orchard. **No dogs allowed inside the gates.**

- 23 **WHITE HOUSE**—*private residence*—A stagecoach stop and inn in the 1860's, the historic White House is now the private residence of Hidden Villa's interns. The adjacent Brownlee Cottage, built in 1995, was designed by Dan Dana and Liz Duveneck Dana.
- 24 **BLACKSMITH FORGE**—Originally built by Frank Duveneck, the forge is used to demonstrate blacksmithing techniques during special programs.
- 25 **WHITE BARN**—Built in the 1860s, the large timbers in the barn are held together pegs, not nails.
- 26 **CREEK HOUSE**—*private residence*—Built in 1947 by the Duveneck family
- 27 **ADOBE CREEK TRAILHEAD**—See Trail Map for description. Horses allowed.



Farm Etiquette

Please help protect our valuable natural resources and ensure an enjoyable visit by following these guidelines and any posted signs and regulations.

- Keep dogs on leash at all times.
- No dogs allowed on trails or wilderness areas.
- Do not go in animal pens without a guide.
- Please do not feed the animals.
- Do not climb on fences and gates.
- Do not chase the free-ranging chickens.
- Respect private residences, fences, and gates.
- Do not pick flowers or fruit.
- Leave shrubs and trees as they are.
- **NO SMOKING** on the ranch or trails.
- Please pack out your trash; Hidden Villa does not have public garbage cans.
